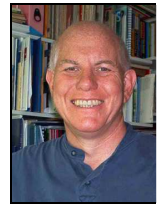




## David Utting, Principal Associate



### Profile

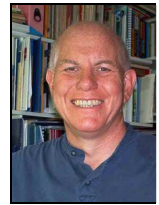
David Utting is a writer, researcher and social policy analyst specialising in issues concerning children, young people and families. From 2008 to 2011, he was Secretary to the Independent Commission on Youth Crime whose report *Time for a fresh start* set out a blueprint for reform in England and Wales. He was previously Deputy Director of the Policy Research Bureau in London and Associate Director (Public Affairs) of the Joseph Rowntree Foundation. At JRF he managed programmes on family and parenthood and public attitudes towards poverty. He also adapted the pioneering prevention science programme *Communities that Care* for use in the UK. In 1998 he was seconded to the government unit planning the *Sure Start* early years initiative. A former political and home affairs journalist, he was also responsible for JRF's media relations. David's many publications include reports for government as well as the Family and Parenting Institute and the National Children's Bureau. His recent work as an editor and contributor includes the JRF's report on *Contemporary Social Evils* and contributing to *Children, their World, their Education*, final report of the Cambridge Primary Review. He is a co-editor of the 2011 and 2012 *British Social Attitudes* reports.
